Mike Westphal as he demonstrates how to use fragrant, fresh greenery to create a stunning porch pot - the perfect way to dress up your front porch, deck or patio.

Winter Containers can offer lots of possibilities; you can use trees, shrubs, perennials and annuals.

But if you want something different, and something that can change each year if you want, I enjoy making porch pots out of fresh greens.

They offer so much texture, color, natural beauty and that fresh evergreen smell

They can be natural, glitzy, or themed

Here is a list of what you will need

- fresh greens of your choice
- container
- soil potting soil works best
- pruners
- ribbon
- pinecones
- sticks
- liahts
- ornaments
- accessories (berries, other greenery, pinecones, continued on next page twigs, etc.)

Step by step process:

- 1. Fill your container with potting soil and wet it down.(fresh greens will continually take up moisture until we get a hard freeze).
- 2. Firmly pack down soil.
- 3. Fill container with an evergreen of your choice.
- 4. Determine the size and shape.
- 5. Once it is full and shaped add other textures with magnolia, holly, acuba or variegated evergreens
- 6. Add some height to the middle with stems, branches or berries (birch is a good opton).
- 7. Add some flair with pinecones, ribbon and/ or ornaments
- 8. Water if dry and enjoy.

TIP: Save all your clippings in case you need them later

- Hanging baskets
- Small indoor arrangements
- Window Boxes

The first step to creating your planter is to gather all of the materials and supplies needed (refer to the supply list provided). Unlike container gardening, where you have to consider various plants requirements and drainage, you can pick pots solely for their decorative appeal.

BEST GREENERY FOR WINTER PORCH POTS

- pine
- spruce
- arborvitae
- acuba
- junipers
- magnolia
- holly

ACCENTS FOR WINTER PORCH POTS

- pinecones
- twigs and branches
- berries (holly, juniper, yew, or beauty berries)
- ribbons and bows
- lights
- ornaments

TIP: Spray fresh greens with Wilt Pruf if they will be outside for any amount of time. This will keep them from turning brown, especially if we have a warmer winter

SUPPLY LIST

Here is a list of what you will need:

- fresh greens of your choice
- container
- soil potting soil works best
- pruners
- ribbon
- pinecones
- sticks
- liahts
- ornaments
- accessories (berries, other greenery, pinecones, twigs, etc.)

STEP BY STEP PROCESS:

- 1. Determine the size and shape of your porch
- 1. Fill your container with potting soil and wet it down. Fresh greens will continually take up moisture until we get a hard freeze.
- 2. Firmly pack down soil.
- 3. Fill container with an evergreen of your choice. Make sure the greenery is dense enough to fill in the open spaces and hide the soil.
- 4. Once it is full and shaped add other textures with magnolia, holly, acuba or variegated evergreens
- 5. Add some height to the middle with stems, branches or berries (birch is great if you can find it).
- 6. Add smaller accents and embellishments like pinecones, ribbon, ornaments, lights, etc.
